#### Featured Artist of the Month – Colin Knapman

Terry talks to member artist and garden designer Colin Knapman to discover how he mixes green fingers and paint stained fingers!



Terry - You are by profession a Garden Designer which no doubt involves your artistic skills as much as your gardening knowledge. Where did it all start, with your artistic skills or your green fingers?

Colin - After a busy working lifetime in the exhibition industry, designing and building exhibition stands for individual clients, involving plenty of travelling and working many unsociable hours I was fortunate enough to sell my business in order to take on new challenges. Like the Roman generals of old and the Whigs and Tories of the 18<sup>th</sup> C I retired to my country 'estate' in the New Forest and took up horticulture. In order to do this properly I enrolled on a Garden Design course at Sparsholt College for four years and obtained a 1<sup>st</sup> class degree in Garden Design.

It was important that we could not only design our gardens on a computer with CAD systems but also to have the ability to do quick sketches directly with clients, which they naturally preferred and were much easier to understand than the architectural plans spewed out by computers.

I naively compare my sketches with that of Joseph Paxton and his initial sketches of The Crystal Palace at the Great Exhibition of 1851 in Hyde Park which were done on table napkins, but maybe that is a too big leap of anyone's imagination!

My tutor at Sparsholt was a great enthusiast of garden history and the historic country houses of that period which rekindled my interest in architecture and the English Garden Landscape movement. This popularised people like William Kent, Lancelot 'Capability' Brown and Humphrey Repton many of which were also accomplished artists and were heavily influenced by the Grand Tours of Italy and the great landscape artists Nicolas Pousin and Claude Lorrain

Having completed the course I set about running my design consultancy business for the next 15 years, but now on a reduced scale and slowly heading towards retirement. Since Covid, and that break from work, I became more interested in sketching with pen and watercolours whilst preferring outdoor sketching whenever possible. I belong to the Urban Sketchers group in Bournemouth and Southampton and now the SGA with Loraine Sherlock's very enjoyable Sunday sketching in and around Salisbury.



Terry - If you were to win the Lottery or indeed decide to retire where would your artist bent take you. Would you change your media, would you experiment with other styles.

Colin - I fear that if I won the Lottery I would become lazy but when I do eventually fully retire I would like to visit more art exhibitions and venues, and we are blessed with so many locally such as Hauser & Wirth in Bruton, Messums in Tisbury and Roche Court near Salisbury, along with the many venues in London. The Angel of the North is on my Bucket list as is Frank Lloyd Wright's Guggenheim Museum in New York and Frank Geary's Guggenheim Museum in Bilbao, both combining art and architecture.

As my early adult life was in the swinging 60's I love the art and music (but not the architecture!) of that period. So, I could easily delve back into Pop Art and experiment with acrylics, maker pens along with various mixed media and collage work. I have already dabbled with this style with my recent attempt currently at Gallery 4 Summer Exhibition at the Salisbury Library with my 2 works 'Tea Bags' and 'Black Shoe', which were strongly influenced by Andy Warhol and his Campbell's Soup Cans.

Now as I am answering your questions it occurs to me that I am unconsciously developing 3 different styles, Firstly, the garden design sketches for clients to see what their gardens could look like which includes my plein air painting groups. Secondly, the finished and framed architectural watercolours of local landmarks as I had on display at the Antelope Café and more recently, as mentioned, my first foray into Pop Art with my 'Tea Bags' and 'Shoes'



Terry - Who is your hero or heroes within the artistic world. Perhaps we should add a rule that it cannot be another gardening designer artist.

Colin - My artistic heroes tend to be those who make the most of the materials and technology around them. In particular my top most influential works and artists would be Marcel Duchamp and his Readymade art the 'gent's urinal', Andy Warhol and his bold, repetitive screen prints, David Hockney and his incredible photographic collages, and finally, it's a toss up between Damien Hirst and Tracey Emin I don't say I like all their works but they are of their time and get you thinking.


Terry - Is there three key pieces of good advice you could give to aspiring artists – of all ages – what would they be?

Colin - My advice to any budding artist is that it is never too late to start and to just enjoy experimenting

Do what <u>you</u> like !— it's your imagination, unleash it to the world, surprise and give pleasure to others. I try to sketch a bit everyday, not finished works of art, just quick doodles or sketches of anything around. It helps to make you more observant and understand perspective, composition, shadows etc.

Watch as many Youtube and Facebook videos as you can, there's tons of free tips and advice out there make the most of them and develop a style the suits you and your ability best.

There were plenty of spots to choose from in sun or shade, and several benches scattered around that were probably more comfortable to work from than our stools or folding chairs. When we first arrived an Historical Enactment Group dressed in military uniform had tents pitched in front of the house, and although interesting to see their equipment and uniforms, luckily they were in the process of packing up leaving us with a clear view of the building and the opportunity to depict it.

It is fascinating to discover these gardens hidden behind some of the Close houses. There is a very ancient copper beech tree in the centre of the lawn of the Rifles garden that has lost some of its enormous branches over the last couple of years, but it is still magnificent and I wondered what events it

had witnessed during its dominant reign over all the other trees and plants.




