Featured Artist of the Month

Lucinda Nicholas tells us about her artistic journey




So where did your art start from ?-

I enjoyed art at school however it wasn't until I needed to use my drawing skills to describe objects and places to children on my speech and language therapy caseload that I started to develop my skills.

I am mainly self-taught in using watercolours although I have attended workshops and classes with local artists where I have learnt tricks and tips that I use in my own work.

So where does your inspiration come from?

I live on the edge of the New Forest in the National Park so gain lots of inspiration from what is around me. I also find that I look at things to relate them to what would make a good card design. I started with family members and godchildren who then suggested other people that they knew that would like my work so my business grew. I now have tea towels, coasters, cushions, mugs and greetings cards with my original design on that I sell through a variety of outlets in the local area. So, who are your favourite artists?

My favourite artists are Trevor Waugh and Pete Gilbert - who also work in watercolours. I also like the pen and wash work by David Gentleman.

Where do you work?

I am lucky to have a Studio in my garden from where I run weekly art classes - mainly in drawing and watercolours. My studio is somewhere I can shut myself away to work for long periods of time on commissions without being disturbed-which is great. I can leave my work out to pick up where I left off - something that I was unable to do when working from the study indoors.

Your best advice?

My best advice to someone starting out: Paint what subjects you want to paint as there will be someone else out there who loves your work as much as you do.

Try out different mediums to find what you like the best then just go for it. Talk to other artists and get tips and tricks from them.

People talk a lot about mindfulness. I believe art and painting is terrific for this as well as being good for the soul.



I would have started painting much sooner had I known how much I would get from it.

My career has been made up of roughly two halves. I say roughly as I'm in a third (and entirely unexpected third phase as a Covid Vaccination Programme Administration worker - initially for 6 months since February 2021 and still going).

The first half, and straight from an MA in graphic design, was spent as a visualiser in a variety of creative agencies. My specialist area was corporate identity and branding.

After working with a selection of blue chip companies in Bournemouth and London I decided to move into a fundraising role with the Trussell Trust Foodbanks charity where I developed a programme of events including running, concerts and art exhibitions!

My own painting life started at school (I was never destined to be a scientist) and I've always loved fine art alongside the contrasting graphic designers- both camps continue to inspire me.

The outbreak of the Covid-19 pandemic and semi-retirement enabled me to spend more time to learn about techniques and to unlearn some of the bad habits!

I had always sought to join a local group of artists but never actioned this intention until recently. Therefore, I'm delighted and excited to join SGA!

For the first time SGA will be hosting TWO major exhibitions in Salisbury Library Gallery 4 - Spring and Summer! So, there's double the opportunity to display our exceptional artwork (paintings?). We're also introducing a new category for smaller work - up to a maximum size of 30 x 30cm which can be submitted FOC alongside up to two larger pieces, paid for in the usual way.

We hope the chance to exhibit smaller work will encourage more submissions especially from artists who prefer to work on a smaller scale.

As in previous exhibitions all work MUST be submitted according to the guidelines e.g ready to hang with D rings and cord. Please check carefully when reading the guidelines that will be issued in the New Year.

Clare Goodman's workshop 'Bringing light into your landscapes and seascapes'

Report from Sue Lee

I'm writing this review after having just returned from this super workshop with Clare Goodman. It was my first one as I am a newish member, and I will definitely be booking more, as not only did I learn new things, but it was lovely to meet other members.

Clare's objectives were to demonstrate techniques, which aim to bring light into land and seascapes, and she showed us a few of her favourites:

- > Using a contrasting background colour mixed with plenty of white
- A constant reminder of tonal values
- Use of shadows to give an impression of light
- Use of additives to add texture. These included a sandy one, a thickener and a glaze, which she added at the end to add more light and bring the different parts of the painting together.

Clare encouraged us to experiment with the sand texture particularly on rocks but also waves and water.

We all had a go and Clare constantly walked round and gave her advice.

The venue, Methodist Church on Roman Road was very good and Clare commented that Annie organized the day beautifully.

Abstracting The Landscape- using Acrylics.

Karen will show techniques using a choice of tools to create paintings that are fun to make. Karen's way of building a painting is divided into four exciting stages. Using this method will control the development of your work with focus.

Many of you know how good Karen is at encouraging the best and often the surprising from her students!





Saturday February 25th - Hampshire artist Alta Edwards.

Painting loose in acrylic inks and paints. Layering from thin to thick. Using acrylic inks for your under-painting. Alta will be using palette knives and introducing found objects. She will work on landscapes and florals.





Saturday 25th March- Terry Kemp

Getting Creative with Clay workshop. This is rescheduled from September. Hurry to book as 6 people are already booked on this workshop (from September). No previous pottery experience necessary!



Saturday 22nd April- Helen Southwell

Create and make fused Glass - Taster session.

(These will be half-day sessions, morning or afternoon. 10am and 1pm).

Explore the wonderful world of glass; experiment with a variety of techniques and materials and produce wonderful glass items. Design and create, choosing from; a hanging suncatcher, tealight, trinket, plant pot decoration, dish, soap dish, coaster etc. Each session will have 8 students at £20 per session (everything provided). No previous glass experience necessary.
