## Where and when did your art work begin ? How important is art to you ?

I started drawing and sketching for fun when I went travelling almost 30 years ago. It was such a great way to spend time and really connect with where I was.

Later, when my two children were tiny, I took part in a handful of art classes, inspired by my wonderful art teacher friend, where I got to experiment with different mediums.

I didn't pick up a paint brush again until a few years ago. I was working in a school at the time. On a whim, I did a painting of my children on a forest walk. I was quite proud of it! I got chatting to a parent who was also a professional artist and one day, I showed her my painting. She was so impressed and said to me quietly "What are you doing working here?!" I guess that moment triggered something in me and I wanted to see what else I was capable of. It was during lockdown that I started to spend hours pouring over the internet, looking at books and old art magazines. I practiced, studied and practised again and now I am producing artwork that I am really proud of.

My attic studio is my escape. Somewhere to forget about everything and get absorbed in creating. That painting of my children is in there on the wall and I enjoy looking at it and seeing how much I have progressed.





 Along with being a member of SGA and exhibiting in our Exhibitions where else do you exhibit and market your work?

All the practising I did, resulted in a lot of good and bad paintings! I had cards made of my favourites and started stocking an Etsy shop. At the same time, I held my very first art exhibition in my garden for family and friends. My Etsy shop went live the same day. It was a nerve wracking moment as I hadn't really shown many people my artwork up until then. I was overwhelmed with the support and encouragement I got from everyone!

Joining and exhibiting with the SGA has been a real big deal for me. Last year's SGA's summer exhibition was the first time I had ever had any of my work in a public exhibition and I was thrilled to win the peoples choice! SGA has been wonderful for me to slowly find my feet and see how other artists react to my work. And of course, I am making some lovely like minded friends along the way.

Apart from the SGA, this summer I will be taking part in Hampshire Open Studios which I'm really excited about. I also have a website now and I use social media to market my work.( See details at end of article)

## We all have favourite subjects or medium- What is yours and why?

Walking around our beautiful New Forest is my inspiration. I was born and bred here and it will always be a magical place for me. It's a great feeling to be able to create a painting of somewhere you love.

I have a soft spot for a wooded pathway and the way the light comes through the trees and leaves, creating beautiful shadows.

I have experimented with various mediums and have fallen in love with acrylics for their bright colours and forgiving nature! They are also extremely versatile and as I work in a small attic space in my house (which doubles up as a spare room) no odour and easy clean up is a win win.

## Do you have any tips to pass on to aspiring artists and crafts people?

I'm not sure I am in a position to pass on tips to aspiring artists as that's what I am! But if I was to say anything, it would be to have confidence and not be afraid to put your artwork out there. Be open to feedback and accept constructive criticism. Make a point of learning from it!

## • Do you have any particular artists that inspire you? And why?

It is very difficult to choose a particular artist. Often it can be a certain painting that I stumble across that will inspire me to paint something similar or try a different technique. However, I love Van Gogh and always have. His use of bright, bold colours and texture really appeal to me. I've also discovered Vera Kisseleva on social media. She is a relatively new artist who has only been professional for a handful of years. Her colourful, bold paintings inspired by the Canadian landscape are beautiful!

VISIT TO LANGFORD LAKES, SUNDAY, APRIL 16th, 2023

It was so peaceful sitting by the lakes watching the water birds, listening to song birds, hearing the plonk of a fish jumping, that I had to remind myself that we were there to sketch. Towards the end of the afternoon many of us gathered at the delightful Kingfisher cafe for refreshments (scrumptious cakes!). It was good to sit and chat and get to know other members, and look at some of the work produced. I think we all agreed that trying to paint this

landscape was a challenge, particularly when it came to depicting still water.

Set in the Woodford Valley, the garden although open to the public is privately owned and we are fortunate to have been granted permission to sketch there. We have been asked to bear in mind that we should not block pathways for other people viewing the garden

Entry fee is £6.50. There is no access to the house, but this can be viewed from the garden for those who prefer to sketch buildings. There is a small plant centre, cafe, and toilets. An exciting new initiative got under way in March to help further promote all arts within the city and surrounding area.

Local art groups, galleries and independent businesses met to discuss and share thoughts and ideas on how best to increase awareness of the city's already vibrant arts community and it's busy event calendar.

The first meeting was well received with the main topic for discussion

focused on how to find easy and achievable marketing options, through to longer term aims.

A collective marketing approach was agreed upon, both locally and to the wider populations, and both accessible and creative ways to achieve this were discussed.

Ideas included:

**Displaying** brochures and leaflets together in designated areas to make a stronger impact.

**Creating** a listing of all art businesses, organisations and groups in one brochure / art guide.

**Having** permanent "What's On' signage within the city dedicated to the arts.

**Using** empty shops and buildings for vibrant, creative marketing.

**Working** with online platforms for a collective approach to marketing what we individually do, through companies dedicated to promoting the City of Salisbury.


Small steps are now being made to enhance the promotion of all art displays and events taking place across the city and together our aim is to:

**Attract** and increase numbers of both regular and new visitors to the City of Salisbury.

**Promote** the town as a 'go-to' ARTS destination for all art and craft lovers.

## IRENE's Personal Project

Irene Coloquhoun has been working on a personal project for the last 6 months, called "Food on a plate".

It all began in Spain, when she was offered a plate of Paella. "I was so fascinated in the texture and colour of the dish, that I thought I would have a go at re-creating the food in acrylics, or as near enough as I could to it. Since then, it has become a challenging journey to create what I eat, see or take photos of. Loving mark making and mixing colours is exciting enough, but lately I have been experimenting with painting on not just canvases, but, plates, and wall tiles, which also make great gifts"

In fact, we were on lock down in Spain during Covid for 7 months. After we had sorted our food problem out, I began to paint again. The only snag was, I didn't have any canvases or paper to paint on. We had loads of tiles though, which turned out to be such a pleasure to paint on. Since then, I am happy to try anything out first. Wonderful how versatile we artists can be.


**Our June Workshop**

#### **DAVID HOCKNEY & EYE-BALLING**

Eye-balling is the term David Hockney uses for the process of looking as he draws or paints or just simply looks. He aims to distinguish between what a camera lens does and what the human eye does. Over a lifetime he has looked and looked, as evidenced in his drawing practices. He has then demonstrated in a wide range of media how to convert this eye-balling into the illusion that is art.

Over the day we will be eye-balling and drawing each other and things, using some of Hockney's materials and methods - coloured pencils , charcoal, ink, watercolour, even ipads and phones if you have them - as well as learning about Hockney's ideas and practices.


